

Pauline Copithorne's scone recipe

Ingredients:

225g (8 oz) self-raising flour, pinch of salt, 1 tsp baking powder, 150ml (1/4 pint) milk, 2 and 3/4 oz of butter (approx.), beaten egg or milk to glaze.

Method:

Sieve flour and put it in to a bowl with salt, and baking powder.

Rub in the butter and add milk to give a fairly soft dough(to resemble breadcrumbs)
Shape doughballs, flatten and glaze
Bake for 15 minutes at 220c until golden brown

The above recipe makes about 8 scones. Delicious! Just one of the many wonderful items brought to our summer services, thank you to all who baked and shared.

Eco Congregation Ireland (ECI)

On Sunday 7 September, we began our journey to make The Kinsale Union a more eco-friendly community. The arrival of the Eco Congregation Candle (see photo on the front page with the Copithorne family) reminds us that as we care for one another, we must also care for the planet not only for this generation, but for future generations to come.

So a little bit about ECI

Eco-Congregation Ireland encourages churches of all denominations to take an eco approach to worship, lifestyle, property and finance management, community outreach and contact with the developing world.

Their vision is to see churches of all denominations throughout Ireland celebrate the gift of God's creation, recognise the inter-dependence of all creation and care for it in their life and mission and through members' personal lifestyles.

They ask Christians everywhere to reflect on the beauty of God's world and to consider what practical steps can be taken to prevent further damage to the environment. Also, to pray for our wounded planet, for people in the developing world already affected by climate change and for future generations.

ECI is a project initiated by the Church in Society Forum – a standing committee of the Irish Inter-Church Meeting. The Roman Catholic, Church of Ireland, Presbyterian and Methodist churches are involved as well as the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers).




1 Timothy 1:12-17; Luke 15:1-10 **Worth finding**

Paul thanks God for his favour and mercy by calling him to ministry despite being the worst sinner of all. If God can change Paul's life, he can change anyone's.

Both the Epistle and Gospel readings this week speak of the lost being sought and found. We have a God who loves to seek out the lost because we are worth finding - a cause for celebration!

Read this week's passages:





Write your name on a strip of paper; then cover it with both hands and pray:

You are not hidden.

Lift one hand.

Thank you, God, that we are all special.

Lift the other hand.

Thank you that we are all found by you. Amen.

Read Luke 15:1-32. Create a three-sentence monologue as if you were either the shepherd, the woman, or the father after they had found what they were looking for. Their joy is meant to help us remember the joy God feels when we are part of God's family.

Living Scripture

'Jesus came into the world to save sinners—of whom I am the foremost.' 1 Timothy 1:15

Can you remember losing something important - perhaps your wallet, a wedding ring, or a child in a shop/crowd? Remember that moment of panic, desperation, the frantic search?

In Luke 15, Jesus tells stories of a lost coin, a lost sheep, and a lost son, and the moment of rejoicing when they are found. In 1 Timothy, Paul tells how he was lost in his wrong beliefs and violence, but God came to find him with grace and mercy to set him on a different path.

Jesus' stories help us understand how precious we are and how much God wants us found and restored. God values each human life enough to stop everything and search, sending Jesus to save us even when we were at our worst. Jesus came, not just for the worthy souls, the bright and best, but for even the worst of sinners - murderers like Paul. Paul's story helps us reflect on what it feels like to be found: it was us who wandered away, in our poor choices, but still God seeks us out and saves us. Allow yourself to feel how much God values you and seeks you out. Will you open your heart to him now?
